






Student Achievement ement

Delaware educators have developed the Delaware Comprehensive Assessment System (DCAS) that serves as a tool to measure student's academic progress. According to the Delaware Department of Education, "the tests are tied to the Delaware content standards that define the knowledge and skills required for our students to succeed beyond high school. The results of the DCAS provide us with an understanding of how well we are preparing students to meet the many challenges that lie ahead. Whatever the results, Delaware students and educators will understand where we are so that we can tell how far we have to go. An accurate assessment of where we are is the first step towards getting where we want to be in order to promote the success of our students."


Below is the percent proficient broken down by grade level of all students in the District in grades 3-8. Students were tested in the subject areas of English language arts, math and students in grades 5, 8 and 10 were also assessed in science.

All 11th grade students are provided structured time to work on SAT prep for a half an hour each day, during the Student Success Academic Period (SSAP). During SSAP students work with a teacher to practice and gain experience working with SAT question types in math and evidence-base reading and writing. Additionally, since all students have iPads, they are encouraged to access College Board and Kahn Academy tutorials, practice items and practice tests online outside of school.

Curriculum Highlights lights

The 2017/18 school year was the inaugural year for the Spanish Immersion Program. Milton Elementary and H.O. Brittingham Elementary were the first to launch the program, and it is currently hosted in grades K-2 in those two buildings. In the 2018/19 school year, the remaining three elementary schools, Rehoboth Elementary, Shields Elementary and Love Creek Elementary, began offering the program. They now have Spanish Immersion in grades K-1. Families interested in the program sign their student up upon their enrollment into kindergarten. During the year, students will spend half of their day learning in English and the other half learning in Spanish. The goal behind the program is to immerse the student into the language and to create a continuous K-12 immersion pathway.

The Cape Accelerated Program (CAP) was created to meet the academic, social and emotional needs of highly-abled learners in grades K-8. Student's talents are fostered with a full range of the arts offered including instruction in art, music and band. Students in the CAP program stay with their assigned classmates for subjects except Math and Language Arts. Students in the CAP program will participate in learning opportunities that require them to utilize creativity, collaboration, communication and critical thinking skills.

During the 2018/19 school year, the District approved the addition of a World Language program at both Beacon and Mariner Middle Schools. Beginning with the 2019/2020 year, students in grades 6-8 will be offered a nine-week Spanish course as part of their World Language Exploratory. Students will focus on learning numbers, colors, days of the week and basic conversation tools to help prepare them for the high school Spanish curriculum. Students at Cape Henlopen High School are required to take two years of the same foreign language and may choose between Spanish, Italian, or French.

Response to Intervention (RTI) is a program offered at the middle school and high school levels. During RTI, students participate in a multi-tier approach of support in academics or with behavior needs. RTI is based on high-quality instruction in the classroom.

Via Advanced Individual The Determination (AVID) program designed to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society. AVID is a program intended for students who find themselves in the "academic middle," but have a desire to go to college. Students have a willingness to develop skills and strategies that are necessary for their academic success and are capable of being successful but are not quite reaching their full potential. AVID students will often be the first in their families to attend college. In the 2018-19 and the 2019-2020 school years, Mariner Middle School was named as an AVID School-Wide Site of Distinction by the AVID Center. While the AVID program starts in 6th grade, students are able to continue their path with AVID through high school.

In the middle school and high school Honors Program, students are challenged with deeper exploration into grade level topics. This is possible due to the quicker instructional pace. The high school honors courses continue to challenge highly motivated students and cover more material than the regular curriculum.

Through Academic Challenge, students are provided the opportunity to participate in a five-year accelerated program of instruction in mathematics and English at Delaware Technical Community College. Students are selected at the end of seventh grade to participate based on aptitude, achievement, subject area performance and overall academic performance. Students at the end of their high school career will take higher levels of Academic Challenge courses in math, English language arts and science.

Students in Level 4 and Level 5 courses have the opportunity to receive college credit for each course successfully completed.

The Cape Henlopen School District 1:1 iPad Initiative offers iPad's to students in grades 6-12. This 1:1 initiative allows students to learn with 21st century technology.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are offered to students in grades 9-12. Students participate in nationally recognized college level classes taught at the high school by certified staff. AP courses provide students with an opportunity that goes beyond facts and figures by helping students to develop critical thinking skills necessary to succeed at the college level. Twelve AP courses are offered at the high school and include a variety of subject matter including: the sciences, math, history, music, and language.

The **Dual Enrollment** program is designed to provide an opportunity for highly motivated students who have a desire to take courses through Delaware Technical and Community College, University of Delaware, Wilmington another accredited University or university during their senior year. This program enables an advanced student to take college level courses while completing his/her high school courses for graduation. Grades and credit hours earned will become part of the student's official college record.

Career and Technology Education (CTE) programs are offered pathways to students at Cape High School. The CTE Henlopen pathways include agriculture science, business finance and marketing, audio, radio and video, processes of design engineering, culinary and hospitality, k-12 teacher academy, textiles and clothing, and allied health. Students are required to take three classes in their selected pathway.

Capital Project Update Pdate



Rehoboth Elementary, the third and final new elementary school being built, started construction in March of 2018. The layout of the building is similar to what was constructed at Love Creek Elementary and H.O. Brittingham Elementary but encompasses a "beach" theme. Historical elements of the current building have also been incorporated into the new school, including a history room, and a future walkway constructed from the bricks of the old building. The new elementary school opened its doors to students in the fall of 2019.

The new **Sussex Consortium** is well underway and is located on Sweetbriar Road in Lewes, Delaware. Because this school services students throughout Sussex County, the project has been completely funded by the state of Delaware. The building will be approximately 97,000 square feet and will serve about 200 students. In the Summer of 2018, Cape Henlopen School District was awarded additional funds within the state's budget, and is able to include a therapy pool, a larger gym, a pre-kindergarten wing, and construct a store front space for the working age Consortium students to have the ability to work directly with local businesses. The new building will open in the winter of 2019.





Milton Elementary renovations are set to begin in the fall of 2019. Students and staff will be housed in the old H.O. Brittingham building for two years while the school is under construction. The historical facade with the columns in the front of the building will remain the same, while the interior of the building will be modified and updated. A new playground will also be added to the back along with two soccer fields and a walkway to connect the school to the Rails to Trails extension. The second floor of the building will be expanded to hold third, fourth and fifth grade classes while kindergarten and first grade will remain on the first floor. The main entrance to the building will also be moved to the rear in an effort to enhance building security.

Cape Clubs and Student Organizations Ganizations

Cape's extracurricular programs, whether it be athletics or the arts, all enjoy a great deal of success. With theatre and arts programs beginning at the elementary school level and culminating at the high school, we have many students who win scholarships based on their skills in the applied and performing arts.

2018-19 Club & Organization Achievements

- Six Cape High School textiles students medaled at the National Family, Career and Community Leaders of America event in California.
- The Cape High School DECA club had 31 students compete at the state level, and 27 were first time attendees. 17 students placed in the competition, and 9 of those were first place awards.
- In only its second year of existence, Mariner Business Professionals of America students rank among the best in the nation. Five individuals and two teams earned awards at the state competition, earning their first invite to the National Conference.
- Beacon Middle School had eleven students selected for the All State Junior Chorus.
- H.O. Brittingham hosted its first ever Robotics competition as part of the VEX IQ Challenge. HOB made up six of the elementary school teams in the finals.
- Love Creek, Rehoboth and Shields Elementary were recognized by the Department of Education Secretary, Dr. Susan Bunting, as Exceeding Expectations award winners.
- Milton Elementary was awarded a \$320,000 grant for their FAME after school program.
- The District had eight teams compete at the Odyssey of the Mind World Competition. Beacon Middle School's team earned a first place for their performance in the spontaneous problem.

The students in Cape Henlopen School District are not only known for their academic performance inside the classroom, but also for their athletic success. At Cape Henlopen High School there are 36 athletic teams including Varsity and Junior Varsity levels. There are also three unified teams that are comprised of typical student athletes and student athletes with intellectual and physical disabilities. Each year over 700 students participate during the fall, winter and spring sports seasons. Beacon and Mariner Middle Schools also each host 15 athletic teams.

Girls Field Hockey (14-1)

The Cape Henlopen Girls Field Hockey team battled Padua Academy to a 5-0 victory, earning themselves the 2018 DIAA State Championship title. The field hockey team has earned a State Championship seven times in the last ten years. First Team All Stars include: Alia Marshall, Cameron Smith, Marcella Sabbagh, and Emily Monigle. Anna Stancofski was named a Second Team All Star. Alia Marshall also earned the recognition of Division I Player of the Year.



Girls Lacrosse (15-0)

In 2019 the Cape Henlopen Girls Lacrosse team brought home their 11th straight DIAA State Championship Title. The girls' together beat Archmere Academy 15-8 to complete their perfect season at 15-0. First Team All-State players include: Karissa Worley, Emily Monigle, Chloe Schaeffer (All-American), and Alia Marshall (All-American) who was also named Player of the Year. Second Team All-State players include: Meredith Lockwood, Lola Messick, and Jillian Seker. Goalkeeper, Laci Dixon was given an Honorable Mention and Coach Lindsey Underwood was named Coach of the Year.



Boys Lacrosse (13-2)

The Cape Henlopen Boys' Lacrosse team earned their first State Championship title since 2014. The team outlasted Salesianum 12-10 in the final game. Luke D'Ambrogi, Jack Dennis, and Matt Prestipino all earned First Team All State, while Gabe Best was named to the Second Team All State, and Greg Boyce was named to the Third Team All State. Coach Mark D'Ambrogi was named Coach of the Year.



Anthony Caruso, Wrestling State Champion

Senior, Anthony Caruso, went into the 2018-2019 Wrestling season as one of the states top wrestlers in the 132 pound weight class. Caruso took first place at the Milford Invitational December 2018, as well as at the DIAA Henlopen Conference Championship at the end of the season in February 2019. Anthony was also named a First Team Henlopen All Conference Athlete.

Sussex County Champions Boys' and Girls' Cross Country

The Boys' and Girls' Cross Country' teams both earned titles as Sussex County Champions in their 2018 season. Cape ran against Sussex county teams including Sussex Tech, Indian River, Sussex Central, Sussex Academy, Delmar and Delmarva Christian. The boys and girls teams each finished their season with an 11-1 record.



Henlopen Conference Champions Girls' Basketball

The girls' basketball team beat Woodbridge High School 56-42 to win the Henlopen Conference Championship title. They went on to compete in the DIAA State Championship tournament, but came up short in the DIAA Quarterfinals.
