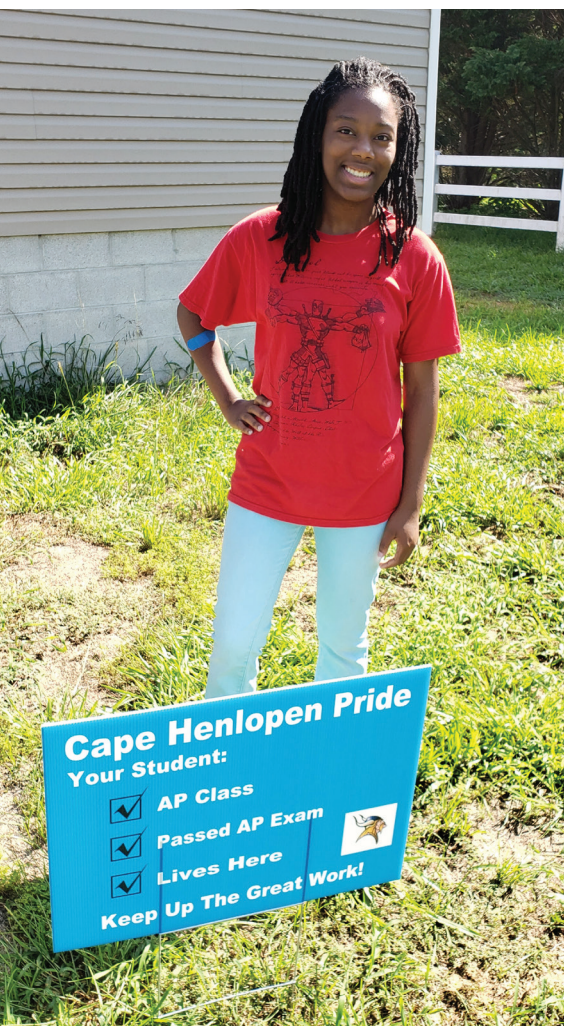

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Welcome to the Annual Report for the 2020-21 school year for Cape Henlopen School District. This publication is a small reflection of the various achievements of our students and staff from the past year. At Cape we are dedicated to preparing students to become productive members of society upon graduation. As a District we are also committed to highlighting and informing our community of our many accomplishments from throughout the previous year.

While the 2019-2020 school year did not end in a traditional manner due to the pandemic, we are happy to say that in September of 2020 we were able to get the majority of our students back in the classroom for in-person instruction. At the start of the year, parents and caregivers were given the choice for remote or hybrid instruction. At the elementary level, students who opted for in-person learning were able to attend school five days a week, while the secondary students were split into cohorts and spent two days learning in-person and three days learning remotely. Both elementary and secondary students had the option to attend school remotely full-time.

With the dedication, diligence, and hard work of our custodians, nurses, teachers, and school administrators our District was able to create and maintain a safe environment for the students. It's also because of this that we were able to continue an in-person learning model the entire school year and were the only District in the state to do so. This could not have been done without support and attention to detail. We are fortunate that COVID-19 did not, and has not, impacted our District with closures or contributed to the spread of the virus in the community.

In September of 2021, we opened our doors to ALL students for full-time, in-person learning. With the appropriate mitigation layers in place in each of our schools, which include masking, social distancing as much as possible, and washing hands frequently, we are confident that this current school year can and will be normal again. Our number one priority is keeping our students and staff safe, while also providing high quality in-person instruction for all of our students in every classroom, every day.

Thank you to everyone for all that you have done and continue to do to support our District's efforts. It is even more evident now that the success of our organization directly relates to the quality of people within our District and in our community. Each and every one of you is making a difference, and for that, we can not thank you enough.

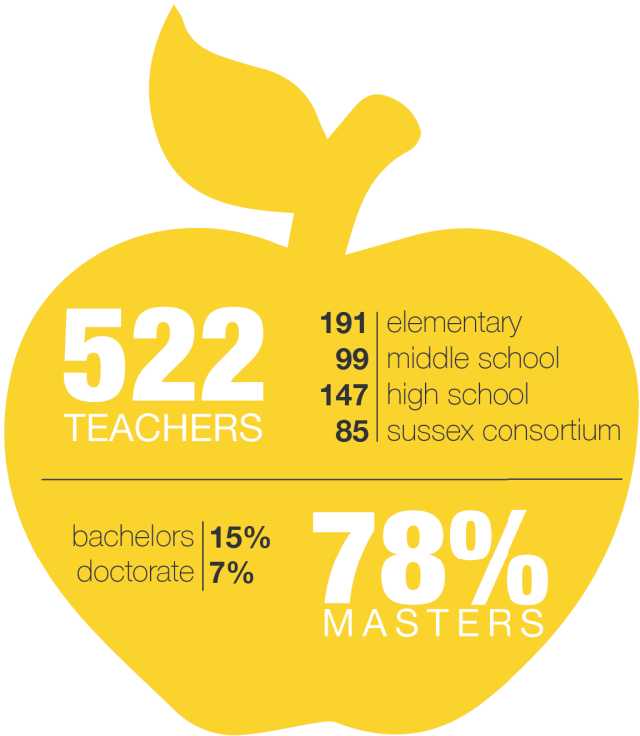

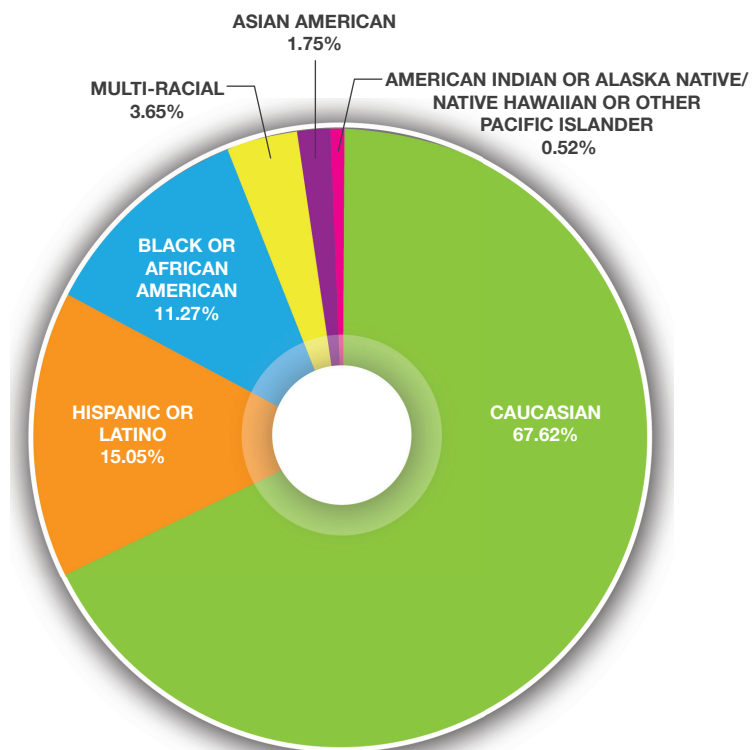

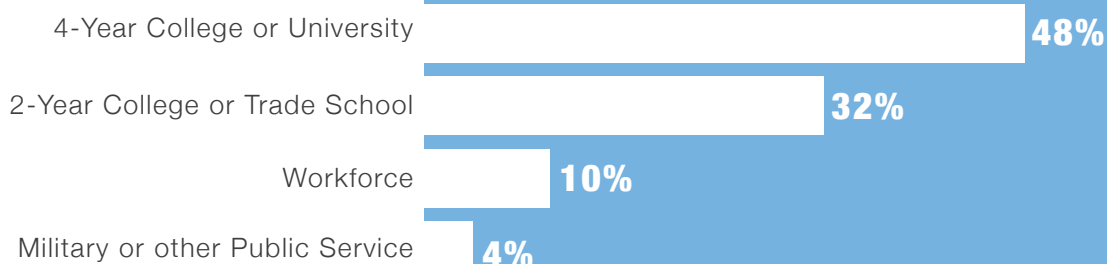

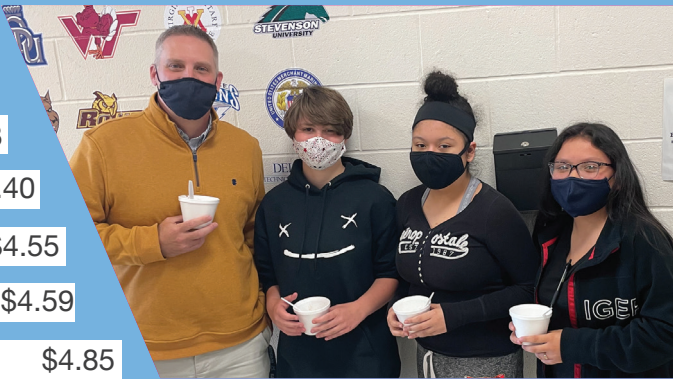
FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

In the fiscal year (FY) 2021, the Cape Henlopen School District's overall budget was \$205.3M, which was an increase of \$13.7M (11.9%) in operations, and an increase of \$22.6M (49.1%) in Capital Improvement Projects (excluding Bond Anticipation Note costs for Debt Service). Projected Revenue in FY 2021 was \$200,639,444.

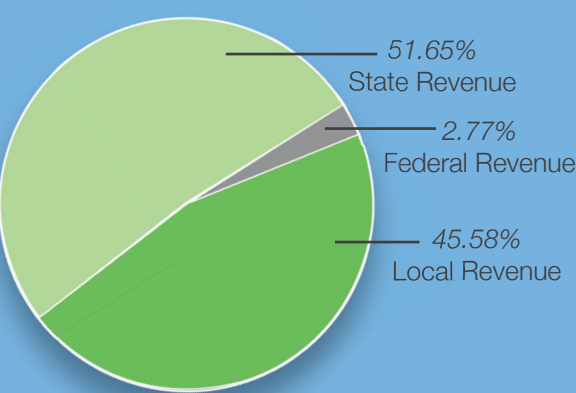
The preliminary budget for the District began its review by the Board of Education in the summer of 2020. The final budget for the 2020-2021 school year (FY 2021) was approved by the Board in February 2021.

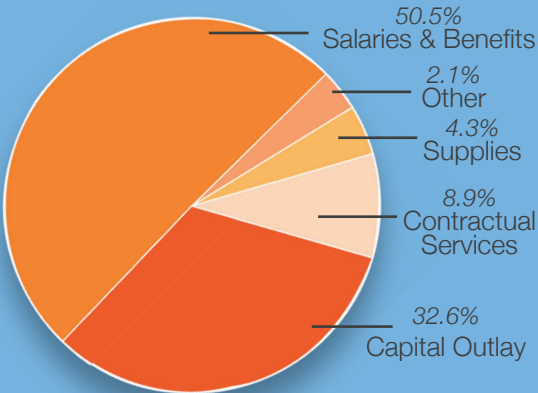


REVENUE BY FUNDING TYPE

Bridges is a comprehensive PK–5 curriculum that equips teachers to fully address state standards in a rigorous, engaging, and accessible manner. *Eureka Math®* has set a new standard for rigor, coherence, and focus in the classroom so students in grades 6-8 gain a deeper understanding of the why behind the numbers, all while making math more enjoyable to learn and teach. For high school students in grades 9-12, *enVision A|G|A* helps students look at math in new ways, with engaging, relevant, and adaptive content.



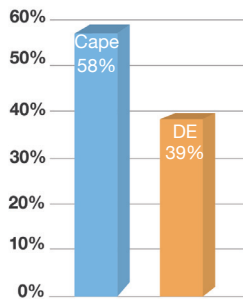
Amplify Science is a K–8 science curriculum that blends hands-on investigations, literacy-rich activities, and interactive digital tools to empower students to think, read, write, and argue like real scientists and engineers. Students in grades 9-12 follow the guidelines and resources provided by the *Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS)*. NGSS provides students opportunities to explore scientific topics through laboratory investigations and other inquiry-based activities. As a result, students will develop their scientific practices and analytical skills.



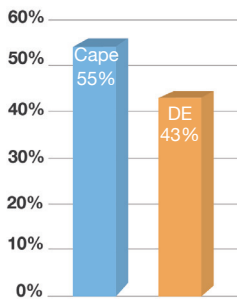

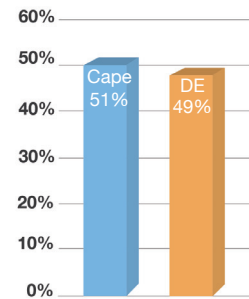
Elementary School Smarter ELA (Grades 3-5)



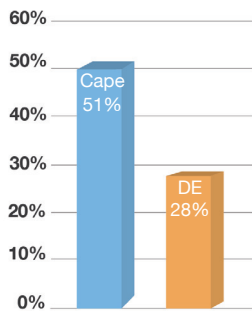
Middle School Smarter ELA (Grades 6-8)



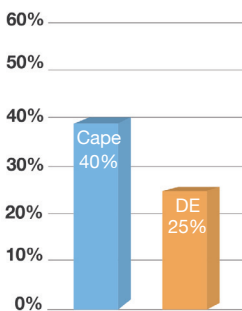
High School SAT Reading (Grade 11)



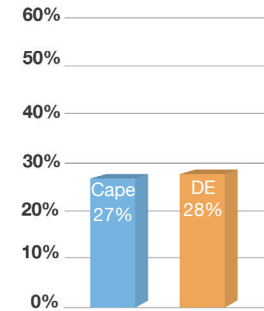
Elementary School Smarter Math (Grades 3-5)

Impacts on the 2021 Assessments

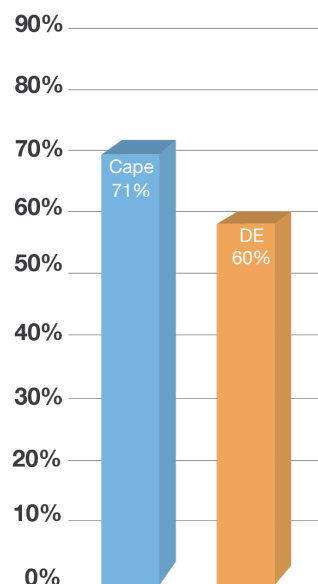
Delaware's annual statewide assessments provide critical data to help measure equity in education. During the 2020-21 school year, the COVID-19 pandemic affected nearly all aspects of education, including the state's annual assessment administration.

Some of the factors impacting assessments included:

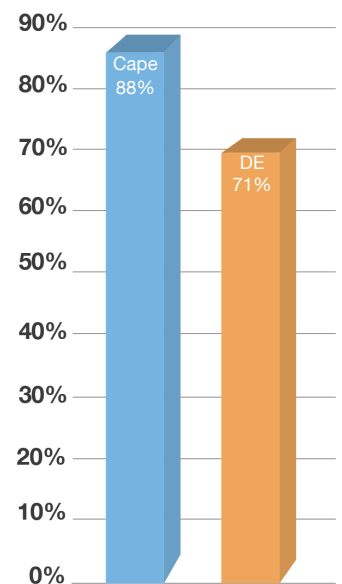
- Technology Infrastructure

These factors among others, do not allow for a direct comparison to previous year's test results but should be used in combination with other data sources. At Cape, we are proud to have had the majority of our students in-person for at least a portion of the week during the 2020-21 school year. Elementary students attending under the hybrid model attended school five days a week in-person. The Cape District had one of the highest participation rates during the state assessments across all grade levels.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

The Cape Henlopen School District's Capital Projects Department is overseen by Director of Capital Projects, Mr. Brian Bassett. Over the last five years the District has opened three new Elementary schools, built an addition to the high school, renovated two elementary schools, opened a new special needs school that services all of Sussex County, and received approval to build a third middle school. Each of these projects were approved through referendums in 2014, 2016, and 2018. All projects are set to be completed by 2024.

Sussex Consortium - Open!

- *The Sussex Consortium opened to students and staff in the winter of 2020, just prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.*
- *The school is located on Sweetbriar Road and services special needs students age Pre-K to age 21.*
- *Students who reside throughout Sussex County may attend this school.*
- *This project was 100% state funded.*

Cape Henlopen High School Addition - Open!

- *The new addition opened its doors to students at the start of the 2021-22 school year.*
- *This addition is a ninth grade wing and accommodates approximately 400 students.*
- *It includes 20 classrooms, and four spaces for high school consortium students.*

Milton Elementary School - Open!

- *This newly renovated building opened to students in fall 2021.*
- *The front of the original building was preserved due to its historical value to the town of Milton.*
- *The new portion of the building was inspired by aspects of the town of Milton's history.*

Shields Elementary School - Under Construction!

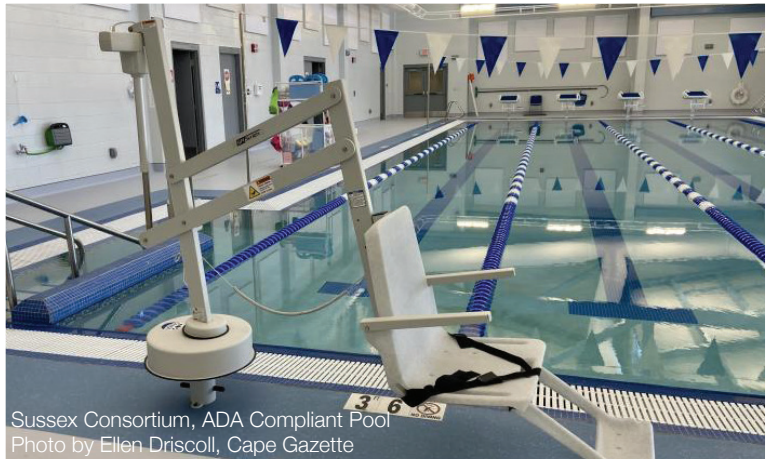
- *Shields will become Lewes Elementary School in spring 2022.*

CAPE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Cape was the **only District in DE to have students in-person** at least part of the week for the entire school year. Elementary students had a five day a week in-person option from the beginning of the year, and the secondary students had a hybrid (two days in person, three days remote) option.

Cape High School **hosted the state's premier virtual musical**, *Ranked* in January 2021. In May 2021, they hosted their first outdoor play, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.



Landon Hayes was the **first student to receive an Italian scholarship** for \$1,100 presented by Italian teacher, Cristina Christy.

Cape High business students **earned 23 medals and filled three state club officer positions**. Medals included 17 for first place, five second place and one third place. Cape's DECA chapter was also named the Achievement Level Chapter Campaign winner for community service.

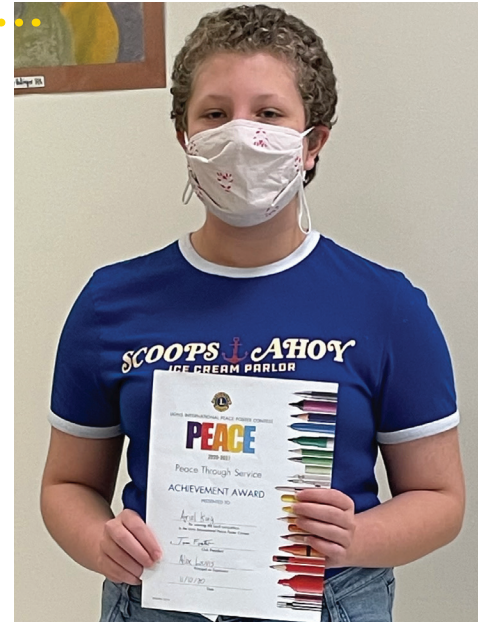
Carly Favoroso, at Mariner Middle School was named as a **Carson Scholarship Winner**. CHHS junior Josephine Ingerski and senior Daniel Adili-Khams were also named as Carson Scholars.

Beacon student, Ariel King, was named the Peace Poster winner for the Annual Lions Club Peace Poster Competition in December 2020. She not only was named as the local chapter winner, but she was also **named the Peace Poster winner for the state of Delaware**.

Mariner Middle School business students earned **two national titles** and finished top 10 in several categories at the BPA National conference.



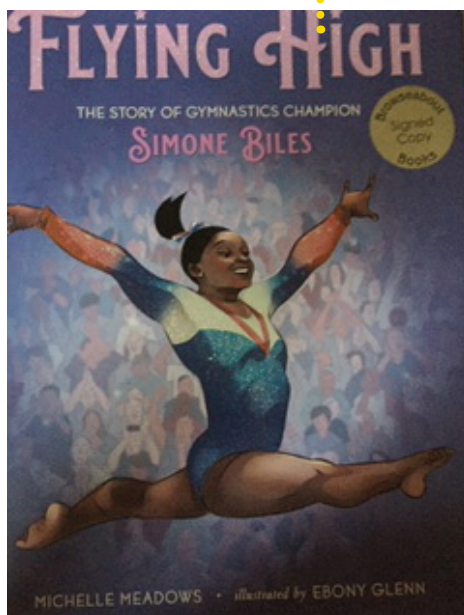
New Cape High teacher, Josh Dickson, expanded what was formerly known as "shop class" into **a new pathway: carpentry, cabinetry and woodworking**. The CTE Pathway provides a completely hands-on experience for students to learn a trade that will provide them an easy transition to college, the military or a skilled career.



Governor John Carney joined students at Rehoboth Elementary School to celebrate Arbor Day. Miranda Garcia was recognized as the fifth grade Sussex County winner of the Delaware Forest Service Arbor Day School Poster contest. Fifth graders, Keiry Oliva Deleon, and Ella Levy also had award winning entries, and Jaelynn Martin won for fourth grade. Fifth grade winners together planted an oak tree at the school.

Cape High 2021 graduates, Megan Erbe and Liam Wiedmann were **among 700 elite musicians selected for a regional ensemble**. Megan was the only Delawarean to be selected for the baritone sax seat in the All-Eastern Division Jazz Ensemble. Liam was one of six DE students selected for the All-Eastern Division Band.

Author Michelle Meadows hosted a virtual visit with Rehoboth Elementary. During the visit she shared her book *Flying High* with students. The book tells the story of Olympic gymnast, Simone Biles.



The Southern Delaware Alliance for Racial Justice launched their recognition program throughout all of the District's schools. Two students from a school each month are selected and recognized for their demonstration of leadership, improvement, effort and excellence.

Cape students go 1:1 with iPad technology. The 2020-2021 school year was the first full school year where all students in grades kindergarten to twelfth grade had a school issued iPad available to them, making Cape a 1:1 technology school.

Love Creek students implemented the **Leader In Me Program philosophy** based on Stephen Covey's book *"The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People."* This program will help students develop leadership skills through a motivational philosophy.



RSC Landscaping, East Coast Garden Center, donated a greenhouse to the Sussex Consortium students to help them learn through engagement, and provide them with an understanding about the processes of plants, soil and growing. It also helps students learn and understand where their food comes from and the importance of healthy eating.

The State of Delaware launched the Educational Support Professional of the Year (ESPY) award. Each building selected a representative to go on and compete at the District level. A District ESPY was selected to compete at the state level. Cape Henlopen recognized a Paraeducator at Shields Elementary School, Chantel Smith, as the ESPY for the 2020-2021 school year.

The Friends of Milton Elementary (FAME) program was held virtually for the first time. Students still participated in a variety of activities and were awarded for their stellar virtual attendance!

Love Creek Elementary **students celebrated World Kindness Day** by making and writing letters for Cards for Hospitalized Kids, and by making dog toys from old socks to donate to Brandywine Valley SPCA in Georgetown.



Shields parent, **Annie Caswell,** shared her experience of **working in a refugee camp** in Albania after CAP students were inspired by Alan Gratz's book, *"Refugee"*. The presentation took place virtually, but Ms. Caswell sent in unique items such as chocolate made by Syrian refugees and a bracelet made from life jackets having been worn by refugees.

ATHLETIC ACHIEVEMENTS

Both the **boys' and girls' cross-country teams** earned Henlopen Conference Championship titles during their fall 2020 season. The boys' team followed the conference championship with a win at the **State Championship**.



The **girls' basketball team** won the Henlopen Conference Championship in February 2021.



The girls' lacrosse team tallied their **12th straight State Championship** in the spring of 2021.



In the winter season, the Coed Cheerleading Squad won their **fourth State Championship**.



Josiah Miller was named the **shot-put State Champion** during the spring Track and Field season.

Luke Bender won an **individual wrestling State Championship** in the 145 pound weight class.



For the **first time in Cape Henlopen High School history**, the wrestling team earned a team State Championship title.

Coach Chris Mattioni also earned the 2021 Delaware State Coach of the Year Award in addition to a Conference Coach of the Year Award.



Notable Achievement: The boys' lacrosse team made it to the State Championship but lost by 2 points in the finals.

The Cape High School **girls' field hockey team** earned their fourth straight State Championship.



Cape Henlopen High School is now home to four Unified Sports teams. During the 2020-2021 school year, **Unified Bocce Ball** was introduced to the students.



The **Unified Track and Field Team** earned a **6-0 record** on their season, but couldn't hold off Smyrna in the State Championship Meet.
