




Student Achievement

Delaware educators have developed the Delaware Comprehensive Assessment System (DCAS) that serves as a tool to measure student's academic progress. According to the Delaware Department of Education, *"the tests are tied to the Delaware content standards that define the knowledge and skills required for our students to succeed beyond high school. The results of the DCAS provide us with an understanding of how well we are preparing students to meet the many challenges that lie ahead. Whatever the results, Delaware students and educators will understand where we are so that we can tell how far we have to go. An accurate assessment of where we are is the first step towards getting where we want to be in order to promote the success of our students."*


Below is the percent proficient broken down by grade level of all students in the District in grades 3-8. Students were tested in the subject areas of English language arts, math and students in grades 5, 8 and 10 were also assessed in science.

All 11th grade students are provided structured time to work on SAT prep for a half an hour each day, during the Student Success Academic Period (SSAP). During SSAP students work with a teacher to practice and gain experience working with SAT question types in math and evidence-base reading and writing. Additionally, since all students have iPads, they are encouraged to access College Board and Kahn Academy tutorials, practice items and practice tests online outside of school.


ELA Smarter Balanced (percent proficient by grade level)




Math Smarter Balanced (percent proficient by grade level)

Curriculum Highlights

In Our Elementary Schools

The elementary level curriculum is designed to meet the needs of every learner. Small group instruction is provided on a daily basis in reading, writing, and math. This allows teachers to tailor their curriculum based on student needs.

Our **CAP, Cape Accelerated Program**, was created to meet the academic, social and emotional needs of highly abled learners.

Student's talents are fostered with a full range of the arts offered at every elementary school including instruction in art, music and band.

Spanish Immersion Program - The 2017/18 school year was the inaugural year of the Spanish Immersion Program. Milton Elementary and H.O. Brittingham Elementary began the program, and at the start of the 2018/19 school year, the program will be available to kindergartners at all five elementary schools. Students start the program upon their enrollment into kindergarten and spend half of their day learning in English and the other half learning in Spanish. The goal behind the program is to immerse the student into the language and to create a continuous K-12 immersion pathway.

In Our Middle Schools

The middle school core curriculum is aligned to the national standards. To meet the needs of all learners, several academic options and programs are offered.

Honors Program - Students are challenged in honors with deeper exploration into grade level topics. This is possible due to the quicker instructional pace offered in honors courses.

AVID, Advanced Via Individual Determination, is designed to close

the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society. In March of 2018, Mariner Middle school was named an AVID School-Wide Site of Distinction by the AVID Center.

Academic Challenge - Students are provided the opportunity to participate in a five-year accelerated program of instruction in mathematics and English at Delaware Technical Community College. Students are selected at the end of seventh grade to participate based on aptitude, achievement, subject area performance and overall academic performance.

CAP is also offered at the middle school level in grades 6 and 7 and continues to meet the needs of our highly abled learners. The intention is to roll the CAP program into 8th grade.

RTI, Response To Intervention - Students participate in a multi-tier approach of support in academics or with behavior needs. RTI is based on high-quality instruction in the classroom.

After school tutoring programs offer students additional assistance and support from a teacher with homework, projects and other assignments.

In Our High School

The high school curriculum offers a wide range of opportunities providing an environment in which students may achieve success in academics and extracurricular activities. Students are empowered to become productive, responsible autonomous members of society.

1:1 iPad initiative - The high school also has a 1:1 iPad initiative that allows students to learn with 21st century technology.

Academic Challenge - Students in the higher levels of Academic Challenge

are offered courses in math, English language arts and science. Students in Level 4 and Level 5 courses receive college credit for each course successfully completed.

Honors Programs continue to challenge highly motivated students. These classes cover more material than the regular curriculum.

AVID, Advanced Placement Via Individual Determination, is designed to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society.

AP, Advanced Placement - Students participate in nationally recognized college level classes taught at the high school by certified staff. AP provides students with an opportunity that goes beyond facts and figures by helping students to develop critical thinking skills necessary to succeed at the college level.

Dual Enrollment - Students participate in college level courses offered by local colleges (Wilmington University and Delaware Technical Community College) without having to leave the high school campus. Students receive college credit for successful completion of these courses.

RTI, Response to Intervention - Students participate in a multi-tier approach of support in academics or with behavioral needs. RTI is based on high-quality instruction in the classroom.



Capital Project Update



H.O. Brittingham Elementary, the second of the three new elementary schools being built as a result of the 2016 Referendum, officially opened its doors to students in September 2018. The new H.O. Brittingham Elementary School is located on Mulberry Street in Milton, Delaware, directly behind the previous H.O. Brittingham building. The design for this elementary school is similar to Love Creek Elementary School and includes a MakerSpace room where students will be creating original videos, Smartboards in all of the collaborative areas between classrooms, and Epson Projectors and Apple TV's in each of the classrooms.

Rehoboth Elementary, the third and final new elementary school being built, started construction in early 2018. The design of the building will mimic what was built at Love Creek Elementary and H.O. Brittingham Elementary and will have a "beach" theme. Historical elements of the current building will also be incorporated into the new school, including a history room, and a walkway constructed from the bricks of the current building. The two buildings that make up the current Rehoboth Elementary will be torn down in the Summer/Fall of 2019. The new elementary school will open its doors to students in the fall of 2019.



The new **Sussex Consortium** is well underway and is located off of Sweetbriar Road in Lewes, Delaware. Because this school services students throughout Sussex County, the project is completely funded by the state of Delaware. The building will be approximately 97,000 square feet and will serve about 200 students. In the Summer of 2018, Cape Henlopen School District was awarded additional funds within the state of Delaware's budget to include a therapy pool, a larger gym, a pre-kindergarten wing, and construct a storefront space for the working age Constoritim students to have the ability to work directly for local businesses. The new building will be opening in the winter of 2019.

Cape Clubs and Student Organizations

Cape's extracurricular programs, whether it be athletics or the arts, all enjoy a great deal of success. With theatre and arts programs beginning at the elementary school level and culminating at the high school, we have many students who win scholarships based on their skills in the applied and performing arts.

- Mariner Middle School was named an AVID School-Wide Site of Distinction.

Viking Pride

The students in Cape Henlopen School District are not only known for their academic performance inside the classroom, but also for their athletic success. At Cape Henlopen High School there are 36 athletic teams including Varsity and Junior Varsity levels. There are also three unified teams that are comprised of typical student athletes and student athletes with intellectual and physical disabilities. Each year over 700 students participate during the fall, winter and spring sports seasons. Beacon and Mariner Middle Schools also each host 15 athletic teams.

DIAA State Championships



Girls Field Hockey (13-2)

The Cape Henlopen Girls Field Hockey team battled Sussex Tech to a 1-0 victory, earning themselves the 2017 DIAA State Championship title. Student athletes, Annie Judge (Senior) and Alia Marshall (Junior) earned a spot on the All-State First Team list, while Jody Boyer (Senior), Marcella Sabbagh (Junior) and Cameron Smith (Sophomore) were named to the All-State Second Team list. The last time the field hockey team won a state title was in 2015.



Baseball (15-3)

For the first time in history, the boys baseball team brought home the DIAA State Championship trophy in the spring of 2018. Senior, Zach Gelof (Shortstop), was named the 2018 Delaware State Baseball Player of the Year as well as the Gatorade Player of the Year. Austin Elliott (outfielder) and David Erickson (pitcher) were named to the DBCA First-Team list and Luke Johnson (Second Base) was named to the DBCA Second Team. Elliott was also named to the DBCA Second Team for his contributions in the pitcher position.



Girls Lacrosse (14-1)

For the 10th season in a row, the Cape Henlopen Girls Lacrosse team brought home the DIAA State Championship Title. Lindsay Monigle (Senior), Mallory Jone (Senior), Alia Marshall (Junior), Annie Judge (Senior) and Vienna Iacona (Junior) all were selected for the First Team All-State list. Katie Frederick (Senior) and Jody Boyer (Senior) were named to the Second Team All-State list.

Additional Athletic Achievements



Boys Varsity Lacrosse

The Boys Lacrosse team made it to the DIAA State Semi-Finals but lost 6-11 to Caravel Academy. They finished their season with a record of 11-4. Liam Zolper earned a spot on the First Team All-State list, while Luke D'Ambrogi, Jack Dennis and Brooks Buck were named to the Second Team All-State rank. Tim Kelley was named to the Third Team All-State list and Gabe Best, one of two Freshman on all four lists, earned an Honorable Mention.



Girls Varsity Soccer

The Girls Soccer team fought their way to the State Quarter-Finals but lost 0-5 to Padua Academy. They finished their season with a record of 8-4-1. Lindsey Swontek earned a spot on the First-Team All State list, while Brooke Hollingsworth and Brayden Smith each made the Second-Team All State list.
